Secretary's Report - Important Information

The last Executive Meeting was held on 3 April 2019. As you are no doubt aware, these meetings are designed to 'nut' out all the decision making so that the regular monthly events are kept relatively free so we can enjoy all types of beekeeping fun, information and education.



As a result of the last Executive meeting, the following outcomes are outlined below for your information.

Executive Meeting - 3.4.19 - Summary of Outcomes

- 1. When the gate (at the school) is locked on monthly club event nights, call one of the phone numbers affixed to the gate gate is unlocked at the end of the meeting when we go to the AG room for supper
- 2. Attendance Sheet now located at the auditorium entrance so that Members/Visitors sign it before sitting down
- 3. Apiary Field Days with the absence of an Apiary Manager that we remove Field Days from the calendar. Field Days will be organised individually and communicated through the Newsletter.
- 4. Management of the hives in the school apiary with the absence of an Apiary Manager Dave and Arthur volunteered to check the hives and get them in a position to survive through winter.
- 5. There are five healthy hives 3 two decker and 2 three decker hives. All hives have good brood patterns and enough honey stores for winter.
- 6. Mowing/cleaning up of the Apiary a huge thank you to Geoff Peoples and Scott Whittaker for completing this.
- 7. Aiming to increase the number of hives in the apiary to 10.
- 8. Blacktown City Show went well. What worked what didn't and areas for improvement discussed and will be considered for further representation.
- 9. The club has kindly been gifted a Flow Hive which will be placed in the apiary.
- 10. Colony Collection Officer position discussions held around how to fill the vacant Colony Collection Officer position was discussed. Further discussions to be held before a decision will be made.
- 11. Auction of pre-loved beekeeping gear will be held immediately before the June Club event.
- 12. Purchase of an electric knife agreed to purchase an electric uncapping knife to be included with loan gear.
- 13. Appointment of Catering Officers (2) It was noted that at the AGM 2019 the filling of the Catering Officer positions (2) were overlooked. Assistant Positions (2) were filled. Nominations were received for Sandy Harrison and Peta Appleroth to fill those positions. Nominations accepted.

- 14. Purchase of assembled frames the club has agreed to purchase some 60 assembled frames that will be available for purchase through the shop.
- 15. Apiary product judging Club Event to be organised. This judging is to focus on what the beekeeper has influence over and what the beekeeper does not have influence over.
- 16. Club Apiary the club plans to stock the apiary with all different types of hives available to represent all beekeeper needs.
- 17. Electrical Testing and Tagging we have approximately 10 items that require testing and tagging on a 6-monthly basis (items mainly used at Shows), quoted \$5.00 per item. Agreed that the quote be accepted.
- 18. Purchase a Printer agreed purchase of a Laser printer/copier which will reside with the secretary for club use.
- 19. Additional swarms provided to existing members agreed that a \$50 fee (per swarm) will be charged. Active/working members of the club may be exempt from the fee.
- 20. Eventbrite was suggested to manage the booking and fee component of loan gear. Suggested researched and reviewed agreed that Eventbrite is not an appropriate tool to meet our needs. The process will continue to be managed manually.
- 21. Colony Collection reimbursement of travel expenses (of swarm collectors) discussed agreed that swarm collection shall be organised so that local people collect local swarms to keep personal costs to a minimum.
- 22. Biosecurity Officer position was not identified at the AGM. GP agreed to be the contact.
- 23. JRAHS Access from the end of Term 2 (6.7.2019) the club can use the AG facilities on Sundays.
- 24. Hive babysitting service recently a member enquired as to whether we offer a hivesitting service for periods of time when members are absent from their homes for work/volunteer commitments. Agreed, we do not have the resources to offer such a service however members can organise such a service between themselves if they choose to.
- 25. Loan Extractor (west) custodian is Andrew Bardsley.
- 26. Loan Extractor (east) custodian is Sandy Harrison.
- 27. Noted that pre-assembled/wired frames were a big seller member (Ben Kirkman) has volunteered to assemble frames for the club which will be on-sold in the shop.
- 28. Additional smokers have been purchased to be used for training purposes only.
- 29. From tonight we will allow 30 minutes for a Questions from the Floor segment where members can ask their beekeeping questions and an experienced beekeeper (or 2) will respond.


April Club Event – "Pseudoscorpions potential as biopest controllers" with Anastasia Shavrova - Summary

To ALL the volunteers a big thank you for your support, friendship and fun. We all know each other better and can work well to support the success of the club.


Flower Power was very happy with our event and we are looking forward to repeating this event in the spring.

Who or what is Col Pulling?

Col Pulling was a veteran of World War II, Gallipoli, France and later, India and a beekeeper.

He saw the need for an organisation of amateurs because of perceived unwelcoming indifference by commercial beekeepers.

Col Guy Pulling, was keen to unify the various aspects of beekeeping and formed a group in 1954 known as the "Amateur Beekeepers' Association of NSW." He conducted practical demonstrations at his apiary near his home at Turramurra. So many more people are interested in bees that the membership of the Amateur Beekeepers' Association of NSW has risen in the present decade from a few hundred to some 2000.



The fledgling association thrived, with members engaged in honey production, queen breeding, and teaching.

By 1961, there were so many actively interested people who travelled significant distances to attend club activities that self-sustaining branches were formed.

Parramatta was one of those Branches.

For many years now there has been much healthy competition between Branches and this year is no expection.

The 2019 Col Pulling Competition will form part of the ABA AGM held on 7, 8 and 9 June 2019 at Western Sydney University, Hawkesbury Campus, Richmond. Over the

past years many Parramatta members have

not been able to attend because of a clash with the St Ives Show. No clash this year so now is your opportunity to attend and compete.

Our **club** participates each year and has been **successful** 8 times since 1988 with the most recent win being last year. Help us with a back-to-back win.

Nucleus Hives - How to Look After Them

When you receive your bees in the Autumn, they need to be fed with **THIN SUGAR SYRUP.** Ts will feed the bees 24 hourly. If they are getting nectar it does not matter as they can only collect that in the warmest part of the day.

To use a frame feeder which can hold $1\frac{1}{2}$ litres of sugar syrup. Remove one frame of foundation nearest a side wall and place the frame feeder in its place. The bees can consume this in a 48-hour period and enables them to draw out the frames of foundation.

Placing the frame feeder next to the side wall enables you to slide over the lid just far enough so the feeder can be filled. Before sliding the lid smoke the entrance and under the lid.

Ten to twelve days after receiving the bees look to see all is well with the queen, she should be laying eggs.

You can put one of those drawn foundation frames between 2 frames of brood and the queen will lay it up. The other 2 frames should be nicely drawn, and the bees will have started to pack the sugar syrup into them. When they are drawn take one out and put in the frame of foundation that you took out to put the feeder in.

The mixture of white sugar to water is done by volume, that is,

1 litre of water to 500 mls measure of white sugar. The mixture is 2:1 by volume.

Once all the frames are drawn and partially filled with syrup feed them with **thick** syrup which is easier to store. The mixture is 2 of sugar to 1 of water by volume.

Once winter comes you **CANNOT** feed bees sugar syrup because they can't utilise it and dry it out, so it sits and ferments and makes **ALCOHOL** which kills bees.

If the bees are starving, you can only place dry sugar on the top of a plastic cover and the bees consume the sugar and add moisture to it so as they can use it. You will find a lot of the sugar outside the entrance to the hive which the bees have thrown out.

Skep hive

Skeps, baskets placed open-end-down, have been used to house bees for some 2000 years. Initially they were made from wicker plastered with mud and dung but from the Middle Ages they were made of straw. In northern and western Europe, skeps were made of coils of grass or straw. In its simplest form, there is a single entrance at the bottom of the skep. Again, there is no internal structure provided for the bees and the colony must produce its own comb, which is attached to the inside of the skep.

Skeps have two disadvantages; beekeepers cannot inspect the comb for diseases and pests, and honey removal is difficult and often results in the destruction of the entire colony. To get the honey beekeepers either drove the bees out of the skep or, by the use of a bottom extension called an eke or a top extension called a cap, sought to create comb with just honey in it. Quite often the bees were just killed, sometimes using

lighted sulphur, to allow the comb to be removed. Skeps could also be squeezed in a vise to extract the honey.

The use of skeps is prohibited because they cannot be inspected for disease and parasites.

This years Apiculture products such as honey and beeswax will be displayed and judged at the St Ives Show. The display and judging will be coordinated by the Parramatta Branch of the Amateur Beekeepers Association of NSW.

ENTRIES:

- No more than two entries from one competitor for any one class.
- A Fee of \$2.00 is to be charged for each entry.
- Certificates will be awarded for First, Second and Third in each class.
- Entries will be accepted at the Parramatta ABA club meeting on Wednesday, 8 May 2019 or at the Showground, Friday, 17 May between 8.30 am and 12.30 pm ONLY.
- Judging will commence at 1.00 pm sharp on Friday, 17 May and no further entries will be accepted at that time.
- Entries must be collected from the Show between 5 pm and 6 pm on Sunday, 19 May 2019.
- Entries should have been produced since June 2018.
- Entries will be on display over the period of the show.
- For honey entries three standard 500 gm glass jars with your selected 4-digit* ID number on the bottom of each are required.

1.	Liquid Honey, Very Light - 3 x500 gm jars (0-15 Pfund)	9.	Beeswax - candles – natural colour, moulded x 2 Candles
2.	Liquid Honey, Light – 3 x 500 gm jars (16-34 Pfund)	10.	Beeswax – dipped candles – natural colour – less than 3 cm diameter x 2 candles
3.	Liquid Honey, Medium - 3 x 500 gm jars (35-59 Pfund)	11.	Beeswax – moulds – natural colour – 2 moulds
4.	Liquid Honey, Dark - 3 x 500 gm jars (60-120 Pfund)	12.	Pollen – cleaned and dried – 1 x 500 gm jar
5.	Natural Granulation Honey (Candied) - 3 x 500 gm jars	13.	Comb Honey – built in hive – 1 ideal frame - displayed in sealed case
6.	Creamed Honey - 3 x 500 gm jars	14.	Comb Honey – built in hive – 1 x full depth Langstroth frame - displayed in sealed case
7.	Liquid Chunk Honey – with comb, same source - 3 x 500 gm jars	15.	Sweet Mead – 2 x 750 ml unlabeled bottles
8.	Beeswax - natural colour, 1 block not less than 500 g	16.	Dry Mead – 2 x 750 ml unlabeled bottles
