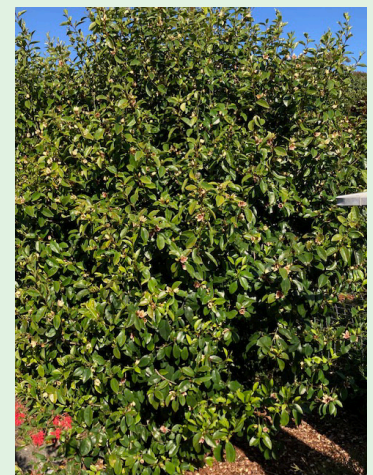
Evergreen magnolias

Evergreen magnolias aren't native to Australia but well loved by bees in backyards across the country.

They usually grow to 2-4 meters tall but are happy to be pruned back if desired. They love sun but are also happy in part shade. They form dense large shrubs and are great for hedging.

mainly in spring and are very robust. Examples are 'port wine' magnolias and magnolia 'little gem'.

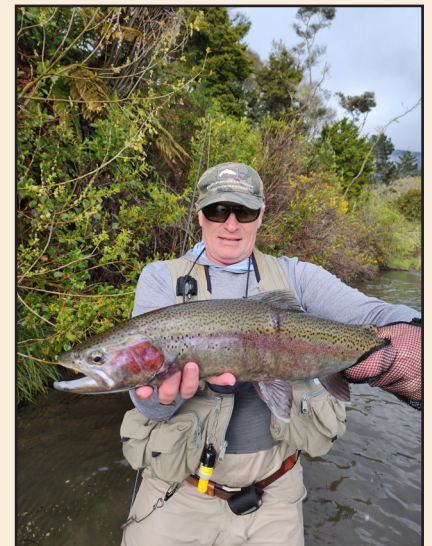

Biosecurity Update

Australia has now moved into the “Management” phase of the varroa outbreak. This means that the authorities will be working to suppress mite spread across the country, and working on defining the national management strategy going forward. A variety of varroa mite treatments have already been approved by the APVMA and more are in the process of being approved.

So far, no reports of varroa detections have been made in Queensland as far as I am aware (6/Nov). Let’s hope it stays that way for some time. For more information on the varroa outbreak response please check various websites including AHBIC, DPI NSW, DAF QLD, and the QBA.

Every beekeeper should be testing for varroa using alcohol wash (ideally) and reporting testing results to their relevant state authority. Presence and absence of varroa is important data. The recommended testing frequency is at least every 16 weeks for every colony. Varroa mite can spread quickly due to hive movements, so it is essential that you test regularly and report results.

An alternative wash has been approved - dish detergent. The best dish detergent to use is Fairy Ultra Concentrate, which can be purchased at Woolies or Coles. Use 10-15ml per 3.5 litres of water, and follow the same method as an alcohol wash. This method is far cheaper per wash than alcohol and safer around lit smokers!

On other pests: Small Hive Beetle numbers are rapidly increasing in the hives I manage. Now is a good time to get your preferred controls in place and to maintain colony strength to give them the best chance to avoid slime-outs. Wax moth also seems to be bad this year with a number of people mentioning issues to me.

JOBS in Your Bee Yard this Month

Use clearer boards to efficiently harvest full supers of honey.

- Lift the top-most full honey super from the colony, bees and all.
- Place a box of sticky extracted frames or foundation frames in place of the full honey super. Keeping your barrier management in mind, these frames probably belong to the hive from the last harvest.
- Place a clearer board on top of the stickies. (Available from most beekeeping suppliers).
- Put the full honey super on the clearer ... Beware heavy lifting may require a helper or two.
- After a few days to a week the bees will have exited the full honey super into the stickies below.
- You can now collect the full honey box without needing to brush or blow thousands of hot bees.

Larsen Hives Sale

I have 6 active hives and a recently captured swarm that I would like to sell as we plan to relocate from our acreage at Beechmont to a smaller block at Westlakes.

Details:

- All hives including the swarm are fitted with Hive Doctor bottom boards and metal queen separators.
- All hives are 8 frame boxes including two supers.
- The swarm box is a ten frame box which will include a super and separator though not yet fitted.
- The second super boxes are new and were only added within the last month.
- The brood boxes and first super are all in good condition.
- Since adding the Hive Doctor bottom boards I have not seen Small Hive Beetles in the hives though I usually see dead beetles in the oil trays in the bottom board.

Prices are \$300 for each hive with two supers and \$200 for the ten-frame swarm box which will also include a empty super. I was prepared to give the swarm away but as I have had to locate it into a box with lid, frames and bottom board I will have to sell it.
